Ward Plan Priorities

Antisocial Behaviour

On evening of 24th March 2016 there was a report of drunk noisy youths near to the school. No trace on Police arrival.

In the early hours of 25th March 2016 a window was damaged by someone throwing a stone in Main St, Killearn.

During the evening of 5th April 2016 a fence within Killearn Primary School was damaged by a group of youths kicking it.

On 9th April there was a report of a noisy party at Harpers Road, Killearn. All quiet on Police arrival.

Road Safety

Static speed checks have been carried out by local officers. 2 drivers were caught speeding at Station Road, Killearn and issued with conditional offer of fixed penalties. One driver will be reported to the PF for speeding at 52mph.

One person was caught speeding at Dumgoyne. He was also issued with a Conditional offer of fixed penalty.

On 16th April 2016 a Road Traffic Collision occurred on the A81 near to Glengoyne Distillery after the vehicle skidded on black ice. No injury was sustained.

Theft

Between 26th – 28th March 2016 a large plant pot with a conifer tree was stolen from a house in Main St, Killearn. A vehicle would have been required to take this pot.
