Ward Plan Priorities

Antisocial Behaviour

On 28th May 2016 a male was arrested after causing a disturbance within a house at Branziet Rd North.

On 9th June 2016 a male was causing a disturbance within the Co-op, in Killearn. He was traced and issues with an Anti-Social Behaviour Fixed penalty.

Road Safety

Regular speed checks have been carried out in and around Killearn in response to concerns about speeding.

There has been reports of a rider of a motor cycle travelling at speed around the village. Officers are aware of this and will make efforts to stop this motor cycle.

Theft

Further to the two housebreakings last month, another housebreaking occurred on the 1st June 2016. Similar to the other two in that entry was forced and jewellery stolen. This also occurred during the day.

Also on the 1st June 2016 three crates of flowers which had been delivered to Endrick Blooms were stolen between 6am-9am.

On 5th June 2016 a bike was stolen from a roof rack whilst vehicle was parked at the rear of Killearn Co-op. A photograph of this bike has been previously sent to Margery for inclusion on the website.

Air Weapons Surrender Scheme

The **Air Weapons and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2015** comes fully into effect on 31 December 2016. The new law will require any person who possesses, purchases, uses or acquires an air weapon to have a certificate to hold them legally.

It will be an offence not to have a certificate for these purposes from 31 December 2016, unless you are exempt, but from 1 July 2016, you will be able to apply to Police Scotland for a certificate.

The new Air Weapons and Licensing (Scotland) Act will:

- Clearly define the air weapons which will be subject to licensing
- Broadly follow the principles and practises of existing firearms legislations
- Enable a fit person to obtain a licence to own, possess and shoot an air weapon in a regulated way without compromising public safety
- Ensure appropriate enforcement of the new regime with robust offences and penalties to deal with any person who contravenes the regime

Police Scotland has been running an Air Weapon Surrender Scheme between Monday 23rd May and Sunday 12th June 2016. Although this campaign is now finished air weapons can still be handed in at a Police Office.
