	Between Saturday, 9 th April and Sunday, 10 th April 2016, a motor car was vandalised on Rowan Crescent, Killearn. Enquiry to date has failed to identify any person responsible. If anyone has any relevant information, please contact Police Scotland or CrimeStoppers.
	On the evening of Friday, 22 nd April 1016, several reports were received concerning youths causing noise in the area of Killearn Primary School and surrounding streets. Several youths were traced by police and advised accordingly.
	In the early hours of Sunday, 24 th April 2016, a report was received about loud music coming from a residential property in Harpers Road, Killearn. Police attended and provided advice.
	On Thursday, 5 th May 2016, a male was found by police to be in possession of a controlled drug on the A875, Killearn. A report has been submitted to the Procurator Fiscal.
	Road Safety
	A male motorist has been reported to the Procurator Fiscal for Careless Driving following an incident on the A875, Killearn, on Thursday, 14 th April 2016 which was reported to police by a member of the public.
	Regular speed checks have been carried out in and around Killearn in response to concerns about speeding. One male was reported to the Procurator Fiscal for driving at a speed of 56 miles per hour on Station Road, Killearn.
	On Saturday, 14 th May 2016, one male was issued with a Conditional Offer of Fixed Penalty for driving a motor car whilst using a mobile telephone on Main Street, Killearn.
	On Monday, 16 th May 2016, a one vehicle road traffic collision occurred on the A875 near to Glengoyne Distillery. No injuries were sustained.
	Several reports have been received over the past month about speeding and inconsiderate parking. Local officers will continue to monitor these issues.

Theft

On the morning/early afternoon of Tuesday, 10th May 2016, a Theft by Housebreaking occurred at a residential property in Drumbeg Loan, Killearn. On the same day, a Theft by Housebreaking occurred at a residential property in Kirkland Avenue, Blanefield.

During the morning of Wednesday, 11th May 2016, a further Theft by Housebreaking occurred at a residential property in Birch Road, Killearn. One perpetrator was disturbed and fled after the householder returned home. The perpetrator is described as a pale white male, early 20's in age, athletic build, with short ginger hair and a hooked nose.

Entry was gained to each property by forcing windows open. A quantity of jewellery, alcohol, electronic device and cash were stolen during these incidents.

Enquiry is still ongoing in relation to these housebreakings, however if anyone has any information, please contact Police Scotland or CrimeStoppers.
