Ward Plan Priorities

Antisocial Behaviour

On 19th July a male was assaulted (minor) within a house in Branziert Rd North, Killearn. A suspect was interviewed however there was not enough evidence to caution and charge anyone.

On 21st July a male was found in possession of cannabis on the A81 near to Glengoyne distillery.

On 5th September there was a report of youths causing annoyance in Birch Road, Killearn. Police attended however there was no trace of the youths.

Road Safety

On 25th June a 2 vehicle RTC occurred on the A809 near to Criaghat House. One male was reported to the PF for careless driving as a result.

On 4th September 2 vehicles were damaged in Balfron Road, Killearn after being struck by another vehicle. The offending vehicle drove off. Enquiry was carried out however at this time there is no way of identifying the offending vehicle.

On 11th September a cyclist who was part of a cycling event was injured after an RTC in Killearn. Minor injury sustained.

Complaints have been received regarding speeding again in Beech Drive. Speed checks have been carried out in this area and this will continue to be the case.

Police patrols have continued around Killearn Primary School at school time in response to complaints about inconsiderate and illegal parking, and we will continue to carry out such patrols. A female was recently cautioned and charged with parking in the yellow zig zag lines outside the school.

Complaints are still being received regarding the parking at Devil's Pulpit. This included mountain rescue performing a rescue of a female in the water who had been within a canoe. Attention has been continuing in the area and Conditional Offer of Fixed Penalties have been handed out.

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Theft

On 20th June 2017 a motorcycle parked on the A809 at Devil's pulpit was stolen.

Overnight between 5-6th July 2017 batteries from the traffic lights situated at Drumbeg Loan were stolen.

On 19th July a vehicle parked at Devil's Pulpit was broken into and a handbag stolen from within.

On 30th July 2017 2 males were traced in Killearn and found to be in possession of a stolen vehicle. They were arrested for various offences.

On that same night a vehicle was stolen from a house in Statin Road, Killearn. The perpetrator walked into an insecure house and stole the key for the vehicle before stealing the car.

On 18th August 2017 the Killearn Kirk parking sign was stolen overnight.

On 11th September a set of windscreen wipers were stolen from a vehicle in Lampson Road, Killearn.

Rural watch is an online community for any member of the public where appeals, crime prevention tips and safety alerts can be posted by those who subscribe which can be viewed by all members. Subscription is free and the sharing of information on the forum is a great example of real time crime prevention in action.

The objectives of Rural Watch Scotland are to:

- •Reduce crime and the fear of crime by providing the right information, to the right people, at the right time.
- •Encourage people to think about safety and security for themselves, their neighbours and their community.
- •Improve community cohesion and well-being by supporting communities to develop 'their watch, their way'.
- •Work in partnership with national and local service providers to develop more resilient communities that are better prepared against threats, intentional or unintentional, such as crime or extreme weather.

The experience of Neighbourhood Watch throughout Scotland and elsewhere across the world is that members of Rural Watch Scotland will be less likely than non-members in the rural community to be a victim of crime.

By joining the Rural Watch Scotland scheme members can receive alerts and advice by phone, text or email. By keeping members informed about crime and other threats in specific areas, Rural Watch Scotland can help prevent crime, keep communities and residents safe, and members responses to these alerts can help catch criminals or be better prepared to deal with other threats to communities.
